Established in 1997, the Hartford KTC & Tara Shedrup Tibetan Buddhist Center is a Buddhist meditation and study center focused on the authentic teachings and practices of the Karma Kagyu lineage of Tibetan Buddhism. In addition to weekly 7 pm Tuesday evening practice and study groups, which are open to the public, the center also hosts visits by several Tibetan Buddhist lamas and teachers each year.

The tour is part of an ongoing series designed to help us learn about the many religious communities which are a part of our Connecticut culture. Each visit includes a tour, a presentation on basic beliefs and practices, and time for questions and conversation. This visit will also include a brief meditation practice. Light refreshments will be provided. Upcoming programs in this series include a visit to the Sikh Gurdwara Guru Nanak Darbar in Southington and the Sri Satyanarayana Hindu and Jain Temple in Middletown.
